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INTERNATIONAL TECHNICAL INFORMATION EXCHANGE:

The Swedish Armed Forces (SAF) are involved in the work on standardizing mine action conducted by NATO through Partnership for Peace.

At the Nordic level, there are networks between the Defence Research Establishments. **The Swedish EOD and Demining Centre (SWEDEC)** is a Swedish Centre of Excellence for mine clearance and explosive ordnance disposal, as well as humanitarian demining within the SAF. SWEDEC is responsible for active participation in international efforts and information exchange.

The Swedish Civil Contingencies Agency (MSB) and SAF through SWEDEC are actively supporting **GICHD** both directly and indirectly in many activities. A good example of such support is the test and evaluation activity at SWEDEC of demining machines using the CEN Workshop Agreement no. 15044 now being a worldwide accepted standard for such equipment.

MSB is a Stand-by partner to the **UN** and **ICRC** and conducts humanitarian operations, including humanitarian mine action, worldwide.

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INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION ON MINE CLEARANCE:

During the period covered by this report (2017), Sweden contributed at least SEK 44 227 957 to mine action. Most of this was channelled through the **Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida)**. For details, see the attached Table 1.

The Swedish Civil Contingencies Agency (MSB) is operational in the field of mine action in support of primarily UNMAS and the ICRC. MSB has an EOD rapid response capacity, as well as expertise in fields such as Mechanical Clearance, Quality Assurance (QA), Mine Detection Dogs (MDD) and IMSMA.

In the reporting period, Mine Action activities have been carried out by the MSB, through UNMAS, in Somalia. The objectives of the UNMAS programme were to implement activities to minimize the impact of explosive hazards for the Somali population and humanitarian actors; support the effective delivery of a sustainable national explosive management capacity; and enable the African Union Mission to Somalia (AMISOM) to fulfil its mandate with greater safety and freedom of movement. MSB has assisted in the areas of Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) training and Weapons and Ammunition Management (WAM) to enhance the Federal Government of Somalia's capacity to mitigate explosive threats and improve weapons, ammunition and explosive management capacity.

Sweden has also supported EOD activities through UNMAS.

In 2017 MSB supported the humanitarian intervention in Syria and Iraq and has provided two quality assurance (QA) officers to the UNMAS Programme in the Central African Republic.

Within its mandate to support peacekeeping and peace building for the UN (through UNMAS under the MoU with UNOPS) MSB has supported the MINUSTAH mission in Haiti with an EOD team to ensure that the area is safe for the public after the mission closed in October 2017.

MSB has also supported MONUSCO through UNMAS, with the primary focus of the UNMAS support to the UN mission being humanitarian, in the Democratic Republic of Congo, as well as the UN Logistics Support Base in Entebbe, Uganda, supporting various UN missions in the region through seconded expertise from MSB.

During the period covered by this report, MSB has conducted technical training and exercises within Mine Action.

The **Swedish EOD and Demining Centre -SWEDEC-** is Sweden's centre of excellence in the field of explosive ordnance disposal and mine clearance. SWEDEC is focused on education and training of individual officers and military units on Conventional Munitions Disposal (CMD) and Improvised Explosive Device Disposal (IEDD) as well as related research and development.

Sweden is the lead nation in the user group for EOD IS where SWEDEC offers an important contribution.

SWEDEC works in partnership with international organizations such as The NATO Science and Technology Organization (NATO-STO) and Geneva International Centre for Humanitarian Demining-GICHD.

TECHNICAL COOPERATION AND ASSISTANCE:

- PSSM support (by SWEDEC) to Bosnia & Herzegovina and Moldavia during 2017
- SWEDEC conducted comparison tests on handheld mine-detectors from 29 May to 9 June 2017. Nine different handheld mine-detectors from seven manufactures participated in the tests.
- New equipment such as roller, gripper and flail tools attached to the demining machine DOK-ING (MV-4) will be tested at Norra Kulla test sites of SWEDEC during 2018

¹ The definition of Mine Action used includes the following elements: i) Mine awareness (measures to make people aware of and to inform people of the risks of mines and unexploded ammunition) ii) Demining (survey, mapping, marking, clearance) iii) Victim assistance (support to victims of mines, including rehabilitation and reintegration), iv) Advocacy (efforts to exert an influence in respect of limitation on the use of landmines and the total prohibition of anti-personal mines), v) Stockpile destruction (destruction of mines in stock). If "Mine Action" is indicated it implies a contribution integrating all the elements in the definition stated. If specific elements in the definition are indicated it implies that a contribution focuses on the indicated elements.
