LEGISLATION:

There is no amendment during the reported period. However, translational modifications were added to the Annex 1.

Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry controls Japan’ s arms export based on the Foreign Exchange and Foreign Trade Act and the Three Principles on Arms Exports as the policy guideline (see the reference below).

The exports of arms and equipment for arms production listed in the Export Trade Control Order (see the attached Annex 1) require export licenses to all destinations.

(Reference)

【The Three Principles on Arms Exports】

The Government of Japan has been dealing carefully with arms exports in accordance with the policy guideline named the Three Principles on Arms Exports (hereinafter referred to as "the Three Principles") in order to avoid any possible aggravation of international conflicts.

Under the Three principles, arms exports to the following countries or regions shall not be permitted:

- (1)communist bloc countries;**
- (2)countries subject to arms exports embargo under the United Nations Security Council's resolutions; and**
- (3)countries involved in or likely to be involved in international conflicts.**

The Three Principles have been the basic policy for Japan's arms exports since they were

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declared in the 1967 Diet session. Subsequently, in February 1976, the Government of Japan announced the collateral policy guideline according to which arms exports to other areas not included in the Three Principles will also be restrained, in conformity with Japan's position as a peaceful nation. In other words, the collateral policy guideline declared that the Government of Japan shall not promote arms exports, regardless of the destinations.

【Annex 1】

Arms and Arms Production-related Equipment listed as Item 1 of the Annexed list 1 of the Export Trade Control Order

Note: Mines fall under the Item 1 of Annex List 1 of the Export Trade Control Order ((2) Explosives) and are subjected to regulation.

- (1) Firearms, ammunition therefor (including those used in the emission of light or smoke), or accessories or parts thereof**
- (2) Explosives (excluding ammunition), explosive dispensers or launchers, or accessories or parts thereof**
- (3) Propellants (excluding explosives) or military fuels**
- (4) Stabilizers for propellant powders or other explosives**
- (5) Directed energy weapons or parts thereof**
- (6) Kinetic energy weapons (excluding firearms) or projectiles, or parts thereof**
- (7) Military vehicles, their accessories, bridges specially designed for military use, or parts thereof**
- (8) Military vessels, their hulls or accessories, or parts thereof**
- (9) Military aircraft, their accessories, or parts thereof**
- (10) Antisubmarine nets, anti-torpedo nets, or buoyant electric power cables for magnetic mine sweeping**
- (11) Armor plates, military helmets, body armors, or parts thereof**
- (12) Military searchlights or control equipment therefor**
- (13) Military bacterial agents, chemical warfare (CW) agents, radioactive materials, or equipment or parts for the dissemination, protection, decontamination, detection, or identification thereof**
- (13-2) Chemical mixtures specially formulated for the decontamination of military bacterial agents, CW agents, or radioactive materials**
- (14) Biopolymers for the detection or identification of CW agents, culture of cells used for the production of such biopolymers, biocatalysts for the decontamination or degradation of CW agents, or expression vectors, viruses, or cultures of cells that contain genetic codes required for the production thereof**
- (15) Equipment and devices used in the production or testing of military propellants, or parts thereof**
- (16) Equipment specially designed for the production of weapons, test devices, or parts or accessories therefor**
