Achievements of Mine clearance

- Gross area: 104 square kilometers
- Number of removed mines: approximately 1,470
- Military participants: 38,230 servicemen from 10 units
- Budget: approximately \$844,800

Mine clearance work is currently in progress in seven unconfirmed minefields. The clearance work was initially planned to have been completed by 2009, but will extend until 2015.
